

# **Indigenous Lecturer or Assistant Professor in Teacher Education**

## Limited-Term, Two-Year Appointment

The Faculty of Education, Western University, invites applications from Indigenous candidates for a non-renewable two-year limited-term appointment, in any teachable area in our Bachelor of Education Program (see <a href="https://www.edu.uwo.ca/teacher-education/index.html">https://www.edu.uwo.ca/teacher-education/index.html</a>). This limited-term appointment will be made at the rank of Lecturer or Assistant Professor, determined by qualifications and experience. The effective date of the appointment may be as early January 1, 2026 or as negotiated. The workload for the limited-term appointment at the assistant professor rank is 80% teaching, 10% educational scholarship/research, and 10% service. The workload for the limited-term appointment at the lecturer rank is 90% teaching, and 10% service.

To address Western's commitment to equity, diversity and inclusion, pursuant to Section 14 of the Ontario Human Rights Code, the selection is limited to applicants who self-identify as Indigenous. Candidates from this group must self-identify as Indigenous, that is First Nations, Métis or Inuit and complete and submit the Western Application form for Indigenous Scholar.

Western, like many postsecondary institutions in Canada, is moving beyond the sole reliance upon Indigenous self-identification in hiring designated Indigenous roles to safeguard against use of incorrect, incomplete, or misleading information regarding claims of Indigenous identity. Candidates who are invited for an interview will be asked to have their claim to Indigenous identity (First Nations, Métis, and Inuit) affirmed through a relational accountability process, led by the Office of Indigenous Initiatives (OII), that is consistent with Indigenous ways of knowing, being, and doing. - In progress or completed PhD;
- Experience in conflict resolution;
- Experience teaching in higher education, including Additional Qualifications.

#### Responsibilities:

The successful candidate must:

- Teach courses in Bachelor of Education program, either in person or online;
- Meet with students on a regular basis;



- · Advise students in the teacher education program;
- · Participate in program governance and other university and faculty-wide services;
- Participate in professional associations at the local, provincial, and national levels;
- Engage in scholarship/research (if included in workload); and
- · Participate in person for service commitments at the Faculty.

A teaching portfolio which includes a teaching philosophy, a statement of teaching interests in the Bachelor of Education, willingness and availability to teach in person, and including a description of successful teaching experiences (e.g., summary course evaluations, peer evaluations, student comments, etc.) (2 pages maximum)
- 4. A description of educational scholarly accomplishments, Google scholar page link (if available), and plans for future educational scholarship (in keeping with a 20% workload) and alignment to one Education research centres or Western Institutes (2 pages maximum)
- 5. A curriculum vitae
- 6. The names and addresses of three referees, who will only be contacted with permission
